


#### The museum premises

The Museum of Blacksmiths' Art and Cutlery is based in a building that is one of the emblems of Maniago's blacksmithing history: the large factory that was first opened by Co.Ri.Ca.Ma. (Associated Cutlery Manufacturers of Caslino and Maniago) in 1907. In a town where little family-run artisan workshops could be found in every house and courtyard, the factory provided employment for hundreds of men and women until it closed in 1972. The derelict building was later bought by the town council and renovated. It was a natural choice for the home of the museum and since 2009 it has hosted a fascinating, compelling exhibition that presents an overview of the roots and developments in local and industrial blade manufacturing.

The history of Maniago's knife makers is one of the distinctive features of the town's identity. The museum is a place "where the local people are reflected and have a chance to reflect in order to get to know themselves and the area where they live better; (...) it's a mirror that the local people show to visitors to give them a better understanding of their activities, their conduct and their private lives."

# The wizard's forge

From the first hammer mills built alongside the mill race fed by the Cólvera stream in 1453, to the modern metalworking and processing industry, the first part of the exhibition looks back at the different historical periods in production, the environments, the tools and the know-how of the blacksmiths of Maniago (known locally as "fávris").

## **3** From obsidian to metal oxide

It is likely that the necessity to cut things was one of the very first needs felt by human beings. This section gives visitors a chance to experiment and analyse the materials, shapes, sizes and ergonomics of cutting tools as they have evolved over the years, focusing in particular on two key components: blades and handles.

#### From functions to training

Over the years, the range of items manufactured locally has included everything from tools for farmers and specific trades, to a new, more varied selection of utensils in which industrial design plays a crucial role. The items on display bear witness and contribute to the ceaseless changes in the world, while also underlining the constant capacity of Maniago's artisans and its small

production scene to keep up with them.

Knives are utensils that are indispensable in everyday life but they can also be dangerous weapons. This area illustrates their ambivalent nature as symbolic items, presenting examples from classical mythology, the history of art and folklore.

#### 6 Armando Pizzinato Room

This room is home to an exhibition that stems from the LAMEMORIA community project. It is a part of the museum where the people of Maniago can share memories, objects, oral and written accounts, and photographs of life in the past and the present in places where manufacturing work is done by blacksmiths.

#### Local interpretation centre

A place to discover and interpret the territory through its different crafts.

The story of the blacksmiths of Maniago all began back in 1453, when Count Nicolò di Maniago had the water of the Colvera stream channelled into a mill race. The first hammer mills were then built, harnessing the power of the water to drive large
